Many of Shakespeare's plays give an idea of the stage properties and special effects which would have been used. A candle, a cauldron and a severed head would have been used as props in Macbeth, and rapiers, a book and a skull would have been used in Hamlet. Severed heads must have been part of the stage properties in Shakespeare's playing company because many of his history plays include beheading as a form of execution.

Special Effects. Playwrights in Shakespeare's time used language to describe 'special effects' much of the time; but acting companies could also produce very, dramatic special effects. Thunder and lightning filled the theatre for storms. There were a variety of effects to suggest magic was at work. Many special effects needed special ingredients. Buying these made a performance more expensive, so special effects were not used all the time.

Stage and screen after Shakespeare. In 1642, the English playhouses and theaters were closed down (and often dismantled for building materials) as the English Civil War began. With the restoration of the English monarchy in 1660, theater returned—as did Shakespeare's plays, now with both male and female performers.

With Londoners flocking to watch Shakespeare's plays, in 1599 he and his employees tore down their old theater and used the beams to build the famous Globe Theater in which Shakespeare's works played to packed audiences on a vast outdoor stage. Shakespeare's company built the Globe only because it could not use the special roofed facility, Blackfriars Theatre, that James Burbage (the father of their leading actor, Richard Burbage) had built in 1596 for it inside the city.The elder Burbage had a long history as a theatrical entrepreneur.In 1576 he had built the first successful amphitheatre, known as The Theatre, in a London suburb.
